The following codes indicate type of observation; H = specific birdcall heard O = flying overhead No numerical entry in the code column indicates at least one bird of the named species was detected. Common species (e.g. noisy miner, crows) were often present.

General comments:

Kedron Brook was flowing strongly and there were fewer water birds noted as a result. At Grinstead Park, there were two Little Black Cormorants and a Pacific Black Duck with two ducklings and drake following.

The finding of an Australasian Bittern was unusual for our region. It was sighted on a dead branch of a tree as Noisy Miners, Magpie-larks and a Sulphur-crested Cockatoo gave the alarm and the Noisy Minors dive-bombed it. Likewise, the Noisy Minors disturbed a Grey Goshawk on a branch in an eucalypt above the fruit colony.

A Cockatiel was seen feeding on grass seed at the edge of the storm water channel entering the Brook at Grinstead Park. It was thought to be an escapee from a caged bird lover.

Of particular note were the numerous sightings of Dollarbirds, both in Sparkes Hill and in Grinstead Park.
