## General comments:

On 4 July, it was fine at Kalinga Park and remained quite a cool morning through to the end of the walk in Benelong Park. We noticed three Bush Stone-curlews on the tree-covered hill above the children's playground area in Kalinga Park. They were still there when we returned at the end of our walk but had moved deeper into cover. Several Strawnecked Ibis were seen including some with pale uncoloured neck feathers. Twenty-seven Masked Lapwings were observed in Shaw Park, and it was here we later saw the huge flock of Little Corellas. Two Long Billed Corellas were clearly visible amongst the flock. We observed a very determined Noisy Miner chasing a Striated Pardalote from tree to tree. The Keith Boden Wetland (Cressy Street) was looking under stress by over-population with many of the water birds being fed by local families. We saw widespread evidence of bread and wild bird-mix being used.
